Meeting Highlights and Discussions

1. Investigational Grab Sampling Program: Letter of Support and Outreach Next Steps

- All grant deliverables are complete except Task 5B (signed letter of support or MOU)
- Dan has prepared a draft letter of support
- The grant concludes September 15, 2022
- The Oakland and Macomb sanitary district Boards meet monthly; the Rouge Valley Sanitary District meets quarterly
- The Work Group has not yet reached out to several first-tier members and communities within target watersheds but outside of the GLWA service area to begin building an understanding of and buy-in for the work plan.
- Based on the locations of these communities, sampling within them would be beneficial to the plan's goals, regardless of their level of interest in participation

2. Investigational Grab Sampling Program: Funding Next Steps

- In Macomb County GLWA charges come through the sanitary districts
- Until the respective Boards meet and discuss, their preferences for how to pay for the program – directly or through GLWA – is unclear
- Counties will consider the complexity of charging areas outside of sanitary districts (i.e. septic areas), internal capacity and costs to complete work.
- Open questions:
 - How would in-kind services play into cost allocation?
 - Could there be a phased approached working within the GLWA service area first and eventually including places outside the GLWA service area?
 - Could the counties contribute in different ways (e.g. direct funding vs. in-kind/ doing the work in-house locally but feeding into regional program)?
 - Can we show that having GLWA leading the data collection could free up county staff to do the investigative work?
 - At what level is having a coordinated regional approach necessary to maintain the value of the program?
- If the Counties do data collection, the next task will be aggregation in the datamart.
- The overall program budget was rounded up from \$1.8 million to \$2.0 million to provide for flexibility; assuming a cost of \$135-\$150 per MST sample
- Costs related to data management were not included in the budget; it was assumed that GLWA would continue to provide these services in kind
- Advantages of GLWA performing the work include the opportunity to build up GLWA's capacity, data centralization, and potential efficiencies of scale
- It might be helpful to define a multiple scenarios (e.g. GLWA does all data collection, different counties contribute in different ways, the counties do all the work, etc.)
