### Meeting Highlights and Discussions

- 1. Welcome and Agenda Review Brittany Galisdorfer, Bridgeport Consulting
- 2. Welcome from CEO Suzanne Coffey, GLWA
  - GLWA CEO Suzanne Coffey highlighted 3 key takeaways that were also referenced in the 1/9/23 letter to Member Partners:
    - $_{\odot}$  Charges: The system-wide charges revenue increase is 2.75% for both water and sewer well below the rate of inflation.
    - Bad debt recovery: Highland Park bad debt expense is not included in the FY 2024 charges.
    - Contract Alignment Process (CAP): For water system Member Partners, the CAP outcomes reflected in the proposed FY 2024 charges create short-term variability while promoting long-term stability.

# 3. Proposed FY 2024 and FY 2025 Water and Wastewater Biennial Budget and Five-Year Financial Plan Update – Nicolette Bateson and Lisa Mancini, GLWA

- Nicolette Bateson, Chief Financial Officer & Treasurer for GLWA and Lisa Mancini, Financial Planning & Analysis Manager for GLWA, gave an overview of the Proposed FY 2024 and FY 2025 Revenue Requirement and Five-Year Financial Plan Update. <u>See presentation for additional details.</u>
- GLWA has developed, and updates annually, its Financial Plan, a set of documents that chart the financial course to long-term sustainability. Financial Plan documents include the FY 2024 and FY 2025 Biennial Budget and Five-Year Plan (FY 2024 – FY 2028), the Ten-Year Financial Plan through FY 2033, the FY 2024 – FY 2028 Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan, the FY 2024 Cost of Service Study from The Foster Group, the One Pager series, as well as additional supporting documents provided to the GLWA Board and its Audit Committee.
- There are several agreements that establish requirements and guidelines for GLWA's financial plan, including:
  - Lease establishing GLWA
  - Water and Sewer Services Agreements between GLWA and the City of Detroit
  - o Master Bond Ordinance(s) authorizing issuance of debt by GLWA
  - Trust Agreement(s) supporting the Master Bond Ordinances
  - 2018 GLWA/DWSD Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)
- Supporting materials, including the <u>FY 2024 Proposed Budget One Pager</u>, <u>FY 2024</u> <u>Proposed Charges One Pager</u>, <u>FY 2024 Cost of Service Study and Service Charge</u> <u>Recommendations</u>, and other documents are available on the Member Outreach Portal.
- Due to recent inflationary pressures, the overall FY 2024 GLWA operating budget reflects a 9.0% increase compared to the originally approved FY 2023 budget,



largely driven by commodity price increases. The FY 2025 operating budget increase is ~5.7%, followed by a return to annual increases of ~2.0% for the remainder of the five-year financial plan period (FY 2026 – FY 2028).

- The proposed FY 2024 Water System Charge Adjustment (the amount by which revenues from existing charges must be adjusted to meet budgeted revenue requirements) is a 2.75% increase. This is the result of a 4.0% budget increase, less 1.25% of increased investment income and positive sales revenue variance.
- Charge adjustments for individual Member Partners will vary based on their relative use of the system, which determines the portion of the annual revenue requirement allocated to them.
- The proposed FY 2024 Sewer Charge Adjustment is a uniform 2.81% increase for all Member Partners: a 2.75% FY 2024 budget increase and a 0.06% increase to recognize contractual amounts related to the OMID-Specific Cost Pool. Because there is no change in Sewer SHAREs for FY 2024, the proposed charges for individual Member Partners are uniformly increased relative to the revenue requirement increase.
- GLWA Board approval is required to approve each component of the "financial plan": Capital Improvement Program (CIP), Operations and Maintenance (O & M) expense, capital financing elements of the budget, as well as charges.

#### 4. Water Charges – Bart Foster, The Foster Group

- In addition to impacts from the 2022 Contract Alignment Process (CAP), in which GLWA and Member Partners negotiated updated contract values for the next fouryear contract period, FY 2024 charge adjustments will also fully implement the FY 2024 Cost of Service Study for all Member Partners for the first time since the FY 2020 Water Charges.
- For FY 2021, FY 2022, and FY 2023, water charge adjustments for individual Member Partners were uniformly increased relative to the revenue requirement increase.
- FY 2024 charge adjustments vary significantly among Member Partners due to relative changes in contract demands, changes in projected sales volumes and implementation of the FY 2024 Cost of Service Study.
- Member Partners and GLWA developed the CAP as an intentional strategy to concentrate changes to charges in the same year, creating variability in one out of every four years while promoting stability in the other three years. Thus, once every four years, there is a charge "reset."
- Contractual obligations in fixed amounts for the Detroit Ownership Adjustment (established by the Lease) and Flint's share of Karegnondi Water Authority (KWA) debt (from which GLWA obtains raw water rights) add ~8.4% to the Wholesale Revenue Requirements.

#### 5. Wastewater Charges – Bart Foster, The Foster Group

- The proposed FY 2024 Sewer System Charge Adjustment is a uniform 2.81% increase for all Member Partners: a 2.75% FY 2024 budget increase and a 0.06% increase to recognize contractual amounts related to the OMID-Specific Cost Pool. Because there is no change in Sewer SHAREs for FY 2024, the proposed charges for individual Member Partners are uniformly increased relative to the revenue requirement increase.
- In addition to the revenue requirement, proposed Member Partner Sewer Charges include \$5.5 million annually related to the Detroit Ownership Adjustment established by the Lease.
- SHARES are scheduled to be adjusted (or "reset") for FY 2025 Charges.

# Q6: On page 14, Table I, of the 2024 Cost of Service PDF file, shows the legacy pension cost going to zero. Is this permanent? The legacy pension accelerated payment is shown as dropping nearly in half. When does this costs end?

*Response*: Couple of items to note:

a) The agreement that lays out the terms of cost sharing of the closed, former defined benefit pension system for the DWSD was among the key foundational agreements that was precedent to the operating effective date of GLWA. That <u>pension agreement</u> is available on the GLWA website. The parties to the agreement are the City of Detroit (via DWSD), GLWA, and the Detroit General Retirement System (DGRS).

- b) The terms of the agreement required that DWSD and GLWA combined, fund the entire actuarial liability at the time over a ten-year period resulting in an annual payment of accelerated \$45.4 million annual payment.
- c) Since this funding requirement was over 10 years rather than a typical amortization period of 30 years, a portion of the annual payment for budget purposes is treated as a "normal cost" and is included in the operating budget. The remaining accelerated portion is treated as payment of a debt, so it is not included in the operating budget but is included in the overall budget as a non-operating expense.
- d) The current year (FY 2023) is the last year for which the accelerated \$45.4 million annual payment (combined GLWA & DWSD and Water and Sewer) was dictated by the foundational agreements.
- e) Since this liability is subject to annual actuarial valuation, the amount due has increased and decreased over time due to typical pension system actuarial factors such as investment rate of return, actuarial assumptions, and level of retiree payouts. After the initial ten-year period, any subsequent liability is commonly referred to as the "tail liability".
- f) For planning purposes, the budgeted FY 2024 "tail liability" obligation is being reduced to from \$45.4M to \$10M in total for DWSD and GLWA. That liability is split 70.3% GLWA and 29.7% DWSD with 43% allocated to Water Operations and 57% allocated to Sewer Operations. The remaining tail liability is now allocated as a nonoperating expense. The legacy pension total is based on annual actuarial analysis. Actuarial and audit reports are also posted on the GLWA website.

Q7: Was there a table that shows every member's increase in a single view?

*Response*: The tables are in the Cost of Service Study, pdf pages 28-30 of 97.

# Q8: Any thoughts on revising the volume estimating methodology to eliminate the 1% annual reduction in off-peak volumes and to exclude the unusually low summer of 2021 from the peak months?

**Response:** GLWA plans to continue with the current process for at least one more year before evaluating the merits of making a change. The policy is designed to ensure full revenue recovery and stability in the overall financial plan and has worked well.

### Q9: What year of asset records are being used for capital costs?

**Response:** FY 2022 – as noted in the FY 2024 cost of service study report dated December 30, 2022 and posted on GLWA's website and distributed to Member Partners enrolled in the Member Partner Outreach portal.

**Q10:** Have mod customers actually been paying shares for FY 2020, 21, & 22? *Response*: <u>See Charges Rollout #4 presentation</u> dated January 19, 2023.



### Q11: Desire to compare cost pool changes from 2020 to 2024.

### Q12: Is it appropriate to say that costs are 90% max day/peak hour?

# Q13: Member Partners used to have two sheets for their charge calculation, is this the new format for their charge sheet?

**Response:** Yes. GLWA continues to strive to improve charges development and roll out communication tools. Additional material has been developed and is available for Member Partners upon request.

# Q14: Is there a guidance document that walks them through how this calc sheet works?

*Response:* See <u>Charges Rollout #4 presentation</u> dated January 19, 2023.

### Q15: What's the current thinking on any sewer methodology revisions for FY 2025?

**Response:** No methodology changes are planned for sewer, but data used in the methodology will be updated to expand the number of years of flow volumes used in calculations and the cost of service will be updated. There are still decisions to made about which cost pools to allocate certain CIP projects.

# Q16: Is the net effect of uniform changes for 3 years, then adjustments concentrated in the 4<sup>th</sup>, contribute to the variability that some customers are experiencing in the preliminary proposed charges?

*Response*: Yes, this is the case for some customers.

# Q17: Which has more impact on charges for a customer, max day and peak hour flow rate or the annual flow rate? Is the absolute value of max day used in calculations or the ratio of max day to average day?

*Response*: The absolute value is used, but because Detroit is the largest water user in the system, its max day is the largest value in the system.

# Q18: On the sewer side, there are annual calculations to show what potential adjustments may be required during the next Mod year. Does it make sense to try and do something similar on water to avoid the "surprise"?

**Response:** The Water Charge Methodology Work Group can discuss the idea of performing this annual calculation, however because the water methodology is more complex than sewer, the exercise may not provide the same benefits as on the sewer side.

  - GLWA's BUDGET or revenue requirement includes 3 key categories:
    - Operations and maintenance expenses
      - Capital program expenses (inclusive of debt service and deposits to the Improvement & Extension Fund)
      - Non-operating expenses such as GLWA's share of the closed, legacy DWSD pension liability pool, Water Residential Assistance Program (WRAP) deposit, and the Lease Payment
  - Operations and maintenance budget trends
    - While GLWA strives to contain the Operations and Maintenance budget for water and wastewater to a 2% annual increase, extraordinary inflation pressures result in higher increases for FY 2024 and FY 2025, followed by a return to annual increases of ~2.0% for the remainder of the five-year financial plan period (FY 2026 – FY 2028).
    - GLWA budgets for staffing using a Full Time Equivalent metric, prorating the budgeted FTE expense by quarter. Due to long lead times for many roles, vacant positions are budgeted as .25 FTE.



- While budgeted amounts for Contractual Services increased 6% from FY 2018 to FY 2024, Chemicals increased 136% over the same time period, due to supply chain impacts.
- Capital Finance Plan
  - Increased reliance on debt in the five-year financial plan is driven by cost increases in the CIP for projects to support system resiliency and service reliability. GLWA continues to aggressively pursue alternate sources of funding (such as grants and low interest loans).
- GLWA's average system charge adjustment for the period FY 2018 FY 2024 is 2.2% for water and 0.9% for wastewater.

# 3. Further Discussion of Hot Topics from Charges Roll Out # 3 – Nicolette Bateson, GLWA & Bart Foster, The Foster Group

- On January 17 and 18, 2023, Bart Foster and Matt Lane met with 9 water Member Partners and 3 wastewater Member Partners to review community-specific charges and answer questions. Questions generally fell within the following topics:
  - Mod/No Mod: Charge Simplicity & Stability Strategies
    - Member Partners and GLWA developed the Contract Alignment Process (CAP) as an intentional strategy to concentrate impacts to water charges in the same year, creating variability in one out of every four years while promoting stability in the other three years.
    - Members were asked, via a poll, to what degree the system-wide FY 2024 water charge variability due to the CAP aligned with their expectations.
      - 56% responded that the variability generally aligned with their expectations
      - 17% responded that there was more variability than expected
      - 5% responded that there was less variability than expected
    - For FY 2021, FY 2022, and FY 2023, water charge adjustments for individual Member Partners were uniformly increased relative to the revenue requirement increase, except for a few Members with out-ofcycle demand changes.
    - After uniform sewer charge adjustments for FY 2022, FY 2023, and FY 2024, Sewer SHAREs are scheduled to be adjusted for FY 2025 to expand the number of years of flow volume data used in the calculations and to implement the sewer cost of service study.
  - o Impact of "CAP Plus" reset
    - In addition to impacts from the CAP, in which GLWA and Member Partners negotiated updated contract values for the next four-year contract period, FY 2024 charge adjustments will also fully implement the FY 2024 Cost of Service Study for all Member Partners for the first time since the FY 2020 Water Charges.
    - Concentrating the CAP, changes in projected sales volumes, and implementation of the FY 2024 Cost of Service Study creates a charge "reset."

  - Schedule / Scope for Water Charge Methodology Review



- A subgroup of Member Partners has been meeting for ~8 months to explore potential modifications to the existing methodology, with stability and simplicity as core objectives guiding the evaluation.
- Process for "interim" contract demand re-openers
  - Member Partners wishing to pursue an interim change to contract demands may bring the request to the appropriate work group (Water Analytical Work Group or the Wastewater Analytics Task Force) for review and evaluation. Contract <u>outreach@glwater.org</u> for more information on the process.
- History / rationale for DWSD / Flint contractual credits
  - Obligations in fixed amounts for the Detroit Ownership Adjustment were established by the <u>Regional Water Supply System Lease</u> and the <u>Regional Sewage Disposal System Lease</u> as part of the founding of GLWA.
  - <u>Agreements</u> between the City of Flint, the Genesee County Drain Commissioner's Office, the State of Michigan, and the Karegnondi Water Authority (KWA) allows GLWA to provide water to Flint, as well as to obtain raw water rights from KWA, which ensures system redundancy for GLWA's Member Partners.
